MART'S 80TH BIRTHDAY BASH! We celebrated this happy event with an afternoon concert at Poynton Methodist Church. It was an amazing afternoon and 170 of our friends turned up to wish Mart well and join in the fun. We were very pleased that we had such a large audience, particularly as it was pouring with rain. We received many donations for the two chosen charities as well as a good number of raffle prizes. The amount of money raised totalled £962.40. Some of this total included donations we received by post from friends who were unable to be there on the day. Half of this amount went to the Woodlands Care Home in Poynton, which is a Methodist-run home. The other half of the money was sent to Adopt-A-Child, a charity in Inverness which supports Christian Schools in Guatemala and Albania, where education is provided for the local children. Mart and Janet support twin boys in Guatemala and receive photos and letters regularly. It was very kind of the Church ladies who made the free tea and coffee for all the audience. They also provided biscuits, as the cake cut into 100 pieces and we didn't expect to need a bigger cake! These kind ladies were available to wash up all the cups etc. too, thanks to them all! One of our ladies made the big cake for Mart, thank you Sally! It was wonderful that people were coming to the concert from so many places, Altrincham, Timperley, Hale, Sale, Knutsford, Wilmslow, Manchester. The ones who came the furthest distance were Ron and Brenda who live in Essex. It has been good to re-acquaint with them from so many years ago when Ron played trumpet in Mart Rodger's Hounds of Sound! Mart had just finished his two years National Service in the Army and Ron was still at school. Ron and Brenda's family were amazed when they were told that their Dad had played in a band with John Mayall! However, Ron packed in playing altogether to study and get on with his further education when Mart folded the band a few months later as he was invited to join the very popular Zenith Six, which was an offer he could not turn down!

JAZZ RECORD REQUESTS: Janet wrote to Alyn Shipton to request a tune for Mart's 80th birthday. She asked him to play "Love Me Or Leave Me" sung by Marion Montgomery with the band which is on our CD "Makin' Whoopee". His assistant let us know it would be played on 5th March, and it was the last number of that programme, following one by our friend, John Hallam! Alyn told the listeners how, when we said "Goodbye" to Marion in Majorca after the Caribbean cruise we had been working on, we didn't realize that it was "Goodbye" for ever as she sadly passed away a few weeks later.

MANCHESTER FILM FESTIVAL: We had a nice surprise when we were invited to play at the Manchester Film Festival on 5th March. We were told that there would be a world premiere of the film, "There's A Future In The Past" which is a documentary about Brooklyn Jazzz Musician, Vince Giordano. We played in the area outside the restaurants and bars during the afternoon, and Vince joined in the whole time. The band enjoyed his playing, and he was obviously very impressed with all our musicians. Our former bassplayer, Colin Smith, played bass on the day as Allan Wilcox was unable to be there with us. Vince had asked if we could arrange for someone to provide a tuba for him to play as this would save carrying his own on the plane, and Colin was willing to lend his tuba. It all took place at "The Printworks" in the centre of Manchester which was the old "Kemsley House" building, hence the new name. Some of the band stayed to watch the film a few hours later, but as it was such a very cold day other band members went home to get warm! In fact, it was so cold that no band uniforms were to be seen - the uniform instructions were "Wear very warm clothing!" Only Louis and Roger played without an overcoat and scarf! Mart has since had an e-mail from Vince to say how much he enjoyed playing with the band.

CD SELECTION: We had completely run out of copies of Tasty Jazz and had run low on "Makin' Whoopee" following some orders received after the Jazz Record Requests programme on Radio 3. New supplies of both have now arrived so we have a full selection of recordings once again. When Mart and Janet had a holiday in Palm Springs some years ago, they took some copies of our CDs with them which were left at the local radio station, KWXY, and had been told that these were being played. They were in shops in Palm Springs one afternoon when the local radio played "Shake It And Break It" by the band! Dining at a restaurant on another evening they handed a copy of "Makin' Whoopee" to the owner, who promptly put it on the CD player. He played the whole record and started it again as one of the customers asked to hear it again. When the customer was told that the band leader was actually dining there, he came over and said to Mart, "thank you for the lovely music!" On our CD "Tasty Jazz" there is a number called "What Do You Mean You Lost Your Dog?" Mart learned this one from clarinet-player Rosie McHargue at his 95th birthday party in Fullerton Ca. when all the audience joined in with the whistling and barking! Rosie was the clarinet-player on Pee Wee Hunt's top seller, "Twelfth Street Rag" which was the first jazz record Mart ever heard and was the reason Mart wanted to learn and play jazz clarinet in the first place !
